## The History of Halloween

The medieval period saw the merging of these customs. People would go "souling," visiting homes to receive soul cakes in exchange for prayers for the deceased. Costumes, including disguises, were still part of the celebration. The tradition of carving pumpkins, or Jack-o'lanterns, also began, with people initially using turnips and other root vegetables.



Halloween as we know it today started to take shape in North America. Immigrants from Ireland and Scotland brought their Halloween customs to the United States. Over time, these traditions mixed with Native American and other European influences, evolving into the fun and spooky holiday we celebrate today.
