Idioms

A piece of cake

Meaning: Something very easy to do.

Example: "The math quiz was a piece of cake."

Bend over backwards

Meaning: To try very hard to help or please someone.

Example: "My mom bent over backwards to make my birthday party special."

Break a leg!

Meaning: A way to wish someone good luck (especially before a performance).

Example: "You're going to be great in the school play. Break a leg!"

Cost an arm and a leg

Meaning: To be very expensive.

Example: "That new video game costs an arm and a leg."

Cry over spilled milk

Meaning: To be upset about something that has already happened and can't be changed.

Example: "Yes, you lost the game, but there's no use crying over spilled milk. We'll practice for next time."

Idioms

Feeling blue

Meaning: To feel sad or unhappy.

Example: "I was feeling blue because my friend moved away."

Get cold feet

Meaning: To suddenly become too scared to do something you had planned.

Example: "He got cold feet right before he was about to go down the big slide."

Give it a shot

Meaning: To try something.

Example: "I've never tried skateboarding before, but I'll give it a shot."

Hold your horses

Meaning: To be patient and wait.

Example: "Hold your horses! We need to pack our lunches before we go to the park."

In the same boat

Meaning: In the same difficult situation as someone else.

Example: "Don't worry if you forgot your permission slip; Sarah did too, so you're in the same boat."

Idioms

It's raining cats and dogs

Meaning: Raining very heavily.

Example: "Take an umbrella; it's raining cats and dogs outside!"

On cloud nine

Meaning: To be extremely happy.

Example: "She was on cloud nine after she got a puppy."

Once in a blue moon

Meaning: Something that happens very rarely.

Example: "My cousin lives in Australia, so I only see her once in a blue moon."

Out of the blue

Meaning: Something that happens suddenly and unexpectedly.

Example: "Out of the blue, my teacher announced we were having a pizza party."

Pull someone's leg

Meaning: To joke or tease someone in a playful way.

Example: "You won a million dollars? Are you pulling my leg?"

Idioms

The straw that broke the camel's back

Meaning: The last small problem in a series of problems that finally makes someone lose their patience.

Example: "When he spilled his juice on his homework, it was the straw that broke the camel's back, and he started to cry."

Two peas in a pod

Meaning: Two people who are very similar or always together.

Example: "Emma and Jasmine are like two peas in a pod; they do everything together."

Under the weather

Meaning: Feeling sick or unwell.

Example: "I'm feeling a bit under the weather, so I might stay home from school today."

When pigs fly

Meaning: Something that will never happen.

Example: "Will I eat broccoli for fun? Yeah, when pigs fly!"

Zip your lip

Meaning: To be quiet or stop talking.

Example: "Zip your lip during the movie so everyone can hear."
